SAFETY

- 1. NOCAC Child Development Centers shall maintain a completed copy of the Child Enrollment and Health Information (JFS 01234) form. This form will be completed and on file at the center by the child's first day of attendance. The form will be reviewed and revised as needed and updated at least annually.
- 2. NOCAC has developed a Medical, Dental and General Emergency Plan to follow in the event that an emergency would occur while your child is in the agency's care. This plan is posted next to the door in all areas used by the children.
- 3. A working telephone will be available at all times in the center. The center phone number is ______
- 4. Fire drills and bus evacuation drills will be held monthly at varying times; weather emergency drills will be held as well during the months of March through September. Dates and times of drills will be recorded and kept on file at the center. Documentation of these drills will be posted on the Family Board in a conspicuous location.
- 5. In the event of an emergency evacuation from the center, the children will be evacuated to
- 6. An emergency escape plan for fire and weather safety will be posted in the center area. These will detail and diagram all possible escape routes and will list staff responsibilities.
- 7. Child Enrollment and Health Information Forms for each child are kept on the bus and in the center at all times so that the information is readily available in emergency situations. Children's addresses, phone numbers, emergency contact numbers, immunization records, etc. will be updated continuously through the year to ensure availability in the event of an emergency.
- 8. A Dental First Aid Chart is posted in the classroom and all other spaces used by the children.
- 9. No child is to be allowed to bring dangerous or large articles from home.
- 10. To reduce accidents, children shall be instructed on proper usage of equipment.
- 11. No child shall be allowed to cause bodily harm to other children.
- 12. All chemicals and potentially dangerous materials are kept out of the reach of the children. No aerosol sprays will be used when children are present.
- 13. Telephone numbers of the fire department, rescue squad, and poison control center will be posted by the telephone and on the school bus.
- 14. If a serious illness or accident occurs while a child is in the center and requires immediate medical/dental treatment, first aid will be administered, the parent will be notified, and the child will be transported to the proper medical/dental facility by the local EMS or by the parent for further treatment.
- 15. An Incident/Injury Report (JFS 01299) will be completed by a NOCAC Child Development Staff member in charge of the child when the following occur: An illness, accident, or injury which requires first aid treatment or a bump or blow to the head or Emergency transporting or an unusual or unexpected event which jeopardizes the safety of children or staff such as a child leaving the center unattended
- 16. If a child receives <u>any</u> injury while involved in the activities, an incident report will be completed and given to the child's parent/guardian for their signature on the same day of the incident. You will receive the original copy.
- 17. If your child has any condition or requires any specialized health or nutrition care, it will be provided as appropriate only after you complete medical and/or medication care forms.
- 18. Written permission from the parent/guardian of a child shall be obtained before any child is permitted to swim or participate in water play activities in bodies of two or more feet in depth. Any water play activities will be properly supervised.
- 19. Universal safety precautions (gloves and hand-washing) are used by all staff when dealing with potentially infectious materials.
- 20. In compliance with the Ohio Revised Code, Section 2923.1212, Concealed Weapons Law, no person shall knowingly possess, have under the person's control, convey or attempt to convey a deadly weapon or dangerous ordnance onto the center's premises. Signs are posted at every entrance to our facilities.
- 21. NOCAC Child Development centers will not transport children in emergency situations. If a child requires transportation, the parent or the emergency squad will be called.



SUPERVISION OF CHILDREN

- 1. No child will be left alone or unsupervised. A staff member will supervise children at all times.
- 2. Arrivals and Departures

Bus transportation is provided for most of the families in the five county area. A few classrooms are self transport due to location and proximity to the center.

Children will only be released to a parent/legal guardian or other designated person over 18 years of age who is on the Child Enrollment and Health Information form or the Release Form.

a. BUS TRANSPORTATION

- Parents/Guardians are required to bring their child to and from the bus.
- Attendance is taken immediately upon entering the bus and again upon arrival at the center and checked again at the time of departure and again on exiting the bus to ensure that all children are delivered home. Staff members will also check for child's presence in daily learning group
- Drivers will check buses at the end of the route to make sure no child is left on the bus and will display "Bus is Empty" sign on the back window.

b. SELF TRANSPORTATION

- Please do not leave your car running while you bring your child into the building.
- Parents are required to bring their child into the center and to the child's classroom.
- Staff must be made aware of your child's presence before the parent leaves.
- Children may not be dropped off at the front door or be sent inside alone.
- When picking up your child, please make sure staff are aware that you are taking your child.
- Children should never be left unsupervised at any time while they are in the building or in the parking lot.

c. CHILDREN ARRIVING FROM OTHER PROGRAMS

- When a child is expected to arrive at one of our centers from another program (i.e. a child with an IEP coming from the Public School), a NOCAC Child Development Staff person will meet the bus at the designated bus stop to get the child.
- If the child does not arrive, staff will first contact the parent to confirm the child was scheduled to arrive at the center that day. Then staff will contact the program from which the child was coming to inquire the whereabout of the child.
- If needed, staff will consult with the parents to determine further action.
- It is exteremly inportant that parents contact NOCAC Head Start when their child is not going to be attending.

WHEN YOU ARE DROPPING OFF OR PICKING YOUR CHILD UP

Policy:

Regular attendance at NOCAC Head Start/ECE centers is extremely important for your child in preparing for Kindergarten. Routine becomes part of your child's day. You are welcome to visit your child in the classroom at any time.

Procedure:

Parents will:

• Notify the staff as soon as possible if your child is not coming in for the day.

Arrival

Upon arrival, authorized caregivers* must:

- 1. Sign their child in on the Arrival/Departure Log
 - a. Everyone is required to write in the time and a signature on the log.
- 2. If arriving early, caregivers must wait with their child until it is time for the Teacher to be in the classroom. Once the Teacher arrives see step 3.
- 3. Make eye contact with your Teacher or staff member and verbally let them know you are here and are dropping your child off for school.
- 4. Wait for verbal confirmation from the staff person before leaving.

<u>Departure</u>

Upon departure, authorized caregivers* must:

- 1. Sign their child out with time child is leaving on the Arrival/Departure Log
 - o Everyone is required to write in the time of departure and a signature on the log.
- 2. Make personal contact with a staff member by using eye contact and verbally telling them you are there to pick your child up.
- 3. Wait for verbal confirmation from the staff person before leaving with your child.



STOP SIGN POLICY




It is very important that we are all doing our part to keep our children safe. You will notice "Stop Signs" throughout the center. Please help us teach your child that when



he/she sees a Stop Sign that means he/she needs to stop and be with an adult before moving on.

If you self-transport your child to and from school please know as part of our school family we trust that you will *help keep our children safe*

while in the center. When you leave the classroom, turn around and physically close the door with your hand so no child comes out of the classroom behind you. Thank you for helping keep our children SAFE!



CHILD ABUSE/NEGLECT POLICY

NOCAC Child Development believes in concentrating on families - not just the parent or child. Our goal is to help you do the best you can in raising healthy, happy children. We understand every household has a different parenting style and we strive to understand and respect the rights of parents. However we also know some parenting styles may place a child at risk of harm and/or injury.

NOCAC Child Development staff are mandated reporters. The definition of mandated is "to authorize or decree (a particular action), as by the enactment of law." All staff are required by Ohio Revised Code 2151.421 to report any suspected incidents of child abuse or neglect. As required by Ohio Job and Family Services, the NOCAC Child Development staff is trained in child abuse/neglect recognition & prevention and is aware of the mandated reporting laws. Ohio Revised Code 2151.421

states, "reporting is required if a mandated reporter suspects that a child under 18 years of age has suffered or faces a threat of physical or mental abuse or neglect.

Staff is expected to follow the policies set forth by the state regarding suspected child abuse/neglect and will be instructed to contact the proper authorities in the event of a concern. If staff fails to report, they



could be found guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree and liable for civil damages. You may contact the Family & Community Engagement Manager at 419-784-5136 ext 1140 with any questions or concerns regarding the child abuse/neglect policy.

CONFIDENTIALITY

In order to fulfill our responsibility in serving you and your family, our staff must obtain personal or sensitive information. All information regarding you and your child(ren) is kept confidential. This means we will not release information to outside parties without signed authorization.

This policy does not include communication between staff when both are working with your family, such as the Family Service Specialist and Teacher or Teacher Assistant, as we believe a team approach is the best method in serving you and your child(ren). In situations of divorce or custody arrangements, we must have custody documentation and if the non-custodial, non-residential parent pays child support and has visitation ordered, this parent is entitled to information about the child's education. If you believe confidentially has been broken, please contact our Central Office at 419-784-2150.

ISSUES OF CUSTODY

We believe parents are the primary educators of their children. This is why our NOCAC Child Development strongly encourages parent engagement from both parents. We understand there are situations when the parents no longer live in the same home, due to divorce or a break in the relationship. In situations of divorce and/or custody arrangements, we must have any court determined custody documentation on file and the parent(s) is responsible to provide any revised/updated documentation once filed with the court. There may be times the non-custodial, non-residential parent would like to participate in our Head Start/ Public Preschool activities.

Our program has an open door policy for all of our Head Start/ Public Preschool parents. This means any parent is welcome to visit our centers (unless there is a documented restraining or no contact order on file with us) at any time. Our staff welcomes parent involvement from both parents regardless of custody/visitation arrangements and we will allow parent participation in our program, even if this conflicts with the custody/visitation schedule. We will NOT allow the non-custodial, non-residential parent to remove the child from the classroom or our center's property, unless otherwise specified by the primary, custodial parent. Our staff will review the Parent Involvement Notification form with parents dealing with custody issues and a copy of the signed form will be on file. Our staff will adhere to custody agreements on file.

Child Care Weather Watch

Watching the weather is part of a child care provider's job. Planning for playtime, field trips, or weather safety is part of the daily routine. The changes in weather require the child care provider to monitor the health and safety of children. What clothing, beverages, and protections are appropriate? Clothe children to maintain a comfortable body temperature (warmer months - lightweight cotton, colder months - wear layers of clothing). Beverages help the body maintain a comfortable temperature. Water or fruit juices are best. Avoid high-sugar content beverages and soda pop. Sunscreen may be used year around. Use a sunscreen labeled as SPF-15 or higher. Read and follow all label instructions for the sunscreen product. Look for sunscreen with UVB and UVA ray protection. Shaded play areas protect children from the sun.



Condition **GREEN** - Children may play outdoors and be comfortable. Watch for signs of children becoming uncomfortable while playing. Use precautions regarding clothing, sunscreen, and beverages for all child age groups.

INFANTS AND TODDLERS are unable to tell the child care provider if they are too hot or cold. Children become fussy when uncomfortable. Infants/toddlers will tolerate shorter periods of outdoor play. Dress infants/toddlers in lightweight cotton or cotton-like fabrics during the warmer months. In cooler or cold months dress infants in layers to keep them warm. Protect infants from the sun by limiting the amount of time outdoors and playing in shaded areas. Give beverages when playing outdoors.

YOUNG CHILDREN remind children to stop playing, drink a beverage, and apply more sunscreen. OLDER CHILDREN need a firm approach to wearing proper clothing for the weather (they may want to play without coats, hats or mittens). They may resist applying sunscreen and drinking beverages while outdoors.

Condition YELLOW - use caution and closely observe the children for signs of being too hot or cold while outdoors. Clothing, sunscreen, and beverages are important. Shorten the length of outdoor time.

INFANTS AND TODDLERS use precautions outlined in Condition Green. Clothing, sunscreen, and beverages are important. Shorten the length of time for outdoor play.

YOUNG CHILDREN may insist they are not too hot or cold because they are enjoying playtime. Child care providers need to structure the length of time for outdoor play for the young child. OLDER CHILDREN need a firm approach to wearing proper clothing for the weather (they may want to play without coats, hats or mittens), applying sunscreen and drinking liquids while playing outdoors.



Condition **RED** - most children should not play outdoors due to the health risk.

INFANTS/TODDLERS should play indoors and have ample space for large motor play.

YOUNG CHILDREN may ask to play outside and do not understand the potential danger of weather conditions.

OLDER CHILDREN may play outdoors for very short periods of time if they are properly dressed, have plenty of fluids. Child care providers must be vigilant about maximum protection of children.

Understand the Weather

The weather forecast may be confusing unless you know the meaning of the words.

Blizzard Warning: There will be snow and strong winds that produce a blinding snow, deep drifts, and life threatening wind chills. Seek shelter immediately.

Heat Index Warning: How hot it feels to the body when the air temperature (in Fahrenheit) and relative humidity are combined.

Relative Humidity: The percent of moisture in the air.

Temperature: The temperature of the air in degrees Fahrenheit.

Wind: The speed of the wind in miles per hour.

Wind Chill Warning: There will be sub-zero temperatures with moderate to strong winds expected which may cause hypothermia and great danger to people, pets and livestock.

Winter Weather Advisory: Weather conditions may cause significant inconveniences and may be hazardous. If caution is exercised, these situations should not become life threatening.

Winter Storm Warning: Severe winter conditions have begun in your area.

Winter Storm Watch: Severe winter conditions, like heavy snow and ice are possible within the next day or two.

CHILD CARE WEATHER WATCH

Heat Index Warning: How hot it feels to the body when the air temperature (in Fahrenheit) and relative humidity are combined.

Relative Humidity: The percent of moisture in the air.

Temperature: The temperature of the air in degrees Fahrenheit.

Wind: The speed of the wind in miles per hour.

Wind Chill Warning: There will be sub-zero temperatures with moderate to strong winds expected which may cause hypothermia and great danger to people, pets, and livestock.

Winter Weather Advisory: Weather conditions may cause significant inconveniences and may be hazardous. If caution is exercised, these situations should not become life threatening.

Winter Storm Warning: Severe winter conditions have begun in your area.

Winter Storm Watch: Severe winter conditions, like heavy snow and ice are possible within the next day or two.

ENROLLMENT

CENTER-BASED PROGRAM OPTION

The center-based program serves children in a Head Start center four days per week. Class sizes range from 15 – 20 children per class depending on the length of the program day and primary age of the children enrolled (fewer children if there are more three year olds, more children if they are more four year olds or if the program operates Full Day). Most centers are licensed by the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services and are Step Up to Quality rated with 4 or 5 Stars. Transportation is offered in most areas and some classrooms families have to self-transport their children to and from school.

The Center-Based Program Option operates on the premise that children learn through playing. Activities in each learning center throughout the classroom are carefully planned so that the children will have the best opportunity for learning. Staff plans activities and experiences based on both individualized and standardized curriculum and lesson plans.

Part Day Center

This option operates either an AM or PM session for 3.5-4 hours per day, Tuesday through Friday. The program runs September through May and is closed during holidays and staff in-service days. Transportation is offered in most areas.

Full Day / Part Year Center

The full day / part year option offers a center session of at least 6 hours and up to 7 hours per day, Tuesday through Friday. The program runs August through May and is closed during holidays and staff in-service days. Transportation for Extended Day services are limited.

HOME BASE OPTION

The Home Base option is designed to serve children who live in rural areas or far from center locations, 3 year olds, children with an Individual Education Plan (IEP), or when it is felt the children would benefit more from a one on one approach.

The Home Base option is based on the premise that the parent/guardian is the primary educator of their child. The role of the Home Visitor (Teacher) is to work directly with the parent/guardian as they work with their child. The focal point of the visit is providing information to the family on what and how to teach the child. The parent/guardian is involved throughout the entire 1 ½ hour visit in the home. At the home visit, you will receive educational information for yourself, your child(ren) and your family. If you are unable to keep your scheduled visit, please contact your Home Visitor before he/she is scheduled to arrive.

Home Base Class occurs twice a month and are for families to participate in group activities and give the children a classroom experience. Parents/guardians are expected to attend with their child to observe, volunteer, or engage in activities designed for families. Transportation is provided to all families. Meal/snack will be offered during the Home Base Class.

CONDUCTING A HOME VISIT (HOME BASE)

- 1. Home visits are conducted in your home by staff members with a parent/guardian participating.
- 2. All home visits will be a minimum of one and one-half hour in length.
- 3. The initial home visit will include completion of any enrollment paperwork not already completed and the Family Handbook will be reviewed.
- 4. Each home visit will include the following:
 - a. Goals are created with the parent to be utilized by parent/guardian and child.
 - b. Activity topics: physical (fine & gross motor), math, social/emotional, cognitive, language/literacy, art, health, nutrition, dental, safety, and cooking.
 - c. Planning activities with the parent for the next home visit.
 - d. Discussing upcoming events and any family concerns or observations.
- 5. Some supplies for home visit activities will be brought into your home, but multiple items from the home will be utilized to encourage further learning.

CHILD CARE LICENSING RULES & REGULATIONS FOR CENTERS

Each facility is licensed to operate by the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS). This license is posted on the Family Board in a conspicuous place for review.

A toll-free telephone number is listed on the facility's license and may be used to report a suspected violation of the licensing law or administrative rules. The licensing law and rules governing child care are available for review at the facility upon request.

The administrator and each employee of the facility is required, under Section 2151.421 of the Ohio Revised Code, ORC, to report their suspicions of child abuse or child neglect to the local public children's services agency.

Any parent, custodian, or guardian of a child enrolled in the facility shall be permitted unlimited access to the facility during all hours of operation for the purpose of contacting their children, evaluating the care provided by the facility or evaluating the premises. Upon entering the premises, the parent, or guardian shall notify the Administrator of his/her presence and sign in.

Rosters of the names and telephone numbers of the parents or guardians of the children attending the facility are available upon request. The parent roster will not include the name or telephone number of any parent who requests that his/her name or telephone number not be included.

ODJF licensing inspection reports and complaint investigation reports, for the current licensing period, are posted on the Family Board in a conspicuous place in the facility for review and can also be viewed at www.odifs.ohio.gov/cdc/childcare.stm The licensing record including previous year compliance report forms, previous year complaint investigation reports, and evaluation forms from the building and fire departments are available for review upon request from the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services at www.odifs.ohio.gov/cdc/childcare.stm.

WRITTEN COMMUNICATION

Staff will send newsletters and flyers with your child and by mail throughout the year. Please check your child's backpack/folder.

FAMILY BOARD

Each classroom has a Family Board to use as a resource when you are visiting the Center. The Family Board includes the following: staff schedules, class schedules, lesson plans, field trip forms, important information and dates, reminders, and a classroom newsletter.

- 4. The center observes the following staff/child ratio and small group size: 1 adult to 10 preschoolers, with a maximum group size of 20.
- 5. Program purpose and goals: NOCAC Child Development provides a preschool experience for low income or disabled children which assists the individual child in developing skills through a multi-disciplinary approach. The area of education, health, mental health, nutrition, parent involvement and social services combine for the development of the "whole" child and family.
- 6. Children <u>must</u> have a physical examination within 30 days of enrollment to continue to attend class in the Center Base Option. Center Based Option children/families will receive two parent conferences and two home visits with the education staff. These contacts will be documented and placed in the child's center file. During those contacts, the teacher will talk with parents about the child's progress, other concerns and ways parents and teachers can work together to help children, etc.
- 7. Fire inspection reports, building inspection reports are available upon request.

ABSENCE POLICY

Regular attendance not only enhances each child's experience with classmates and teachers, but also increases his/her chance of having a rewarding and positive educational experience. It establishes a positive pattern for school attendance early in a child's school career.

- NOCAC will record attendance daily for each child.
- If your child is going to be absent you are required to contact the center within one hour of your child's classroom start time.
- NOCAC staff will conduct home visits if a child has had three or more absences with no contact from the family.
- NOCAC Head Start ECE staff will select a "MY CHILD'S ATTENDANCE GOAL" sheet is to be completed by the family
- If a child ceases to attend, NOCAC staff will make appropriate efforts to reengage the family to resume attendance. If the child's attendance does not resume, then it will be considered a vacant slot.

EXTENDED ABSENCE POLICY

Reasons for a child to have an extended absence may include but are not limited to:

Visiting an ill family member out of state

Vacation

Visiting non-custodial parent

Child is ill or was injured

Expired Physical

Other extenuating situations

If the parent/guardian reports that their child will be absent for an extended period of time, the Teaching Team or other Child Development Staff will contact the Family Service Specialists in writing or an email. Families can also provide written documentation to center staff concerning their child's absence. The following information needs to be documented:

- Reason for extended absence
- First date of absence
- Date of return
- Parent's signature (if they are writing a note)

NOCAC Head Start/ECE will hold a child's spot for 2 weeks, unless it is for a documented medical reason such as a broken bone or surgery. If the child is going to be out for 2 weeks or less NOCAC Head Start staff will monitor and follow up as necessary.

If a child is out for a medical reason for more than 2 weeks, the qualified NOCAC Head Start staff will inform the family that an Educational Home Visit (unless the parent has a doctor's note stating child should not participate) will need to be conducted each week (starting the 3rd week) the child is absent. A qualified NOCAC Head Start staff person (determined by the Center Manager) will complete an Educational Home Visit that needs to be 1.5 hours in length and will be documented on the Home Base Lesson Plan which will be turned into the Education Manager.

If the family cancels an Educational Home Visit, the teacher will have the family sign a Missed Home Visit form documenting reason for not completing the visit and give the parent an educational materials bag. If the family refuses to complete the home visit the child will be withdrawn from the Home Base program and the family can reapply for the program when the child is ready.

WITHDRAWING YOUR CHILD

We understand there are times when a child needs to be withdrawn from a class. Communication from you in the event your child needs to be withdrawn is very important. Our Family & Community Engagement Manager must be notified by telephone, email, or in writing if you wish to withdraw your child from our program. When you speak with the Family & Community Engagement Manager, you will be asked to identify the reason for your request to withdraw. If you notify us in writing, please identify the reason for your request and your child's last day of attendance. We also need your signature to confirm your wishes. If we have observed a concern with your child's attendance and you have not made any attempts to improve the situation, we may be forced to withdraw your child from our program. 419-784-5136 Ext 1105

CLASSROOM TRANSFERS

Although we make every attempt to enroll each child into the most appropriate class/option, we understand there are times when a transfer is necessary. If you wish to request a transfer you can complete a Transfer Request form that your teacher has available for you or you can email or call the Family & Community Engagement Assistant at 419-784-5136 — ext. 1140 or ibenner@nocac.org. The Family & Community Engagement Manager will attempt to comply with your request. In the event there are no openings at the time of your request, your child may continue to attend the class he/she is currently enrolled in or you can request your child be withdrawn from the class and placed on our waiting list until an opening in the class/option you want is available.

ECE TUITION/FEES

NOCAC Head Start and ECE do not charge a registration fee. Head Start is a free service to those who qualify based on income. If your child is enrolled in ECE Preschool, monthly tuition will be based on your gross monthly income. You will be asked to sign a Tuition Contract which indicates your monthly tuition. Tuition is due on the 10th of each month. A 10% late fee is added on the 11th of each month. If your incomes decreases or you experience financial difficulties, contact your teacher or Family Service Specialist for assistance and the possibility of adapting your tuition.

SMOKE-FREE ENVIRONMENT

Program instruction ACYF-PI-HS-95-04, effective May 1995, requires Head Start/Public Preschool programs to create a smoke-free environment for children and adults and to eliminate exposure of children, staff and other adults to tobacco smoke. Smoking is never allowed in a NOCAC Child Development site. This includes classrooms, staff offices, kitchens, restrooms, parent and staff meeting rooms, hallways, outdoor play areas, and all agency vehicles.

Smoking is not allowed in front of the children during group socialization activities which include field trips, neighborhood walks or other outdoor group activities.


In addition, please consider the health of your child and others involved during home visit time. Please try to refrain from smoking. If you wish to quit smoking and want more information, please contact the Health Coordinator at the central office.

TRANSPORTATION

TRANSPORTATION ORIENTATION INFORMATION

- □ Transportation routes/bus stops are determined at the beginning of each program year based on established routes, safety, parent/guardian needs and classroom enrollment at one permanent site.
- Parent/Guardian will notify the center if their child will not be attending or in need of bus services. Messages can be left at your center at any time, day or night.
- ☐ Your PICK UP TIME is the time the bus is scheduled to LEAVE your stop. Please have your child OUTSIDE at your designated bus stop a minimum of 10 minutes before this time. If you are not present with your child at the pick-up time, the bus will continue with the route and it will then be the parent or guardian's responsibility to transport the child to school.
- Your DROP OFF TIME is the time the bus is scheduled to ARRIVE at your stop. Parents/providers need to be available at the designated bus stop to receive their child 15 minutes before the scheduled drop off time and until the bus arrives. If a child is taken home and the parent/guardian is not present, the driver will continue the route without releasing the child. After all the children have been taken home, the driver will attempt to take the child home a second time and will try and contact parent/guardian a second time. If no one is home, the child will be taken back to the center. If the parent or emergency contact cannot be located within a half hour after arriving back at the center, staff must call the Department of Job & Family Services/Children Services or Law Enforcement (if JFS is close for the day). They will be told the situation and that we will wait another 30 minutes for the parent. If the parent or contact person is still not located, the child will be released to JFS or local police/sheriff's office.
- ☐ The parent or authorized adult must wait for the hand signal and escort child to and from the bus unless approved in order to both pick up and release the child. We do not permit children to leave the bus until we see a person listed on the emergency contact form, who must be at least 18 years of age.

- ROUTE CHANGES: Our Bus Policy states that children will be picked up and delivered to their regular bus stop. If due to an emergency, a child needs to be picked up or dropped off at a different location this will only be done with written permission from the parent or guardian before the affected pick-up and drop off routes. Please do not ask to change stop locatians unless it is due to a varied work schedule, an emergency or a permanent change. Please give your driver changes in writing with at least 24 hours notice so that all parents can be notified of pick up or drop off time changes.
- ☐ **CELL PHONES:** Buses are equipped with cell phones which are to be used for necessary communication with the center or in emergency situations. Parents/providers should not call the bus cell phone, but should always contact the center with concerns.
- SELF TRANSPORT: Children should arrive no earlier than ten minutes before class and be picked up promptly at the end of class. Children must be accompanied into the center by a parent or guardian. Children must be delivered directly to a classroom staff person.



TRANSPORTATION SERVICES FOR CHILDREN SCHOOL DELAYS

If the weather is bad, listen to your local radio and/or TV station to find out if the center will be delayed or cancelled. There may also be times when the center must cancel or delay transportation or class not related to weather. Talk to your teacher about the "REMIND SYSTEM".

Bus Routes

- 1. Bus routes are to be under one (1) hour, if at all possible, therefore pick up/drop off points may be utilized to keep your child from being on the bus for more than one (1) hour.
- 2. If your child has a pick up/drop off point the child must remain in the vehicle until the bus completely stops.
- 3. Because the bus runs on a schedule, if your child is not ready, the bus cannot wait if there is traffic and cannot come back. Please have your child ready at least 10 minutes early.
- 4. Child/parent must wait for the hand signal before approaching the bus. Parent/guardians are required to_assist the child onto the bus.
- 5. The Child Enrollment and Health Information forms for each child are kept on the bus at all times so that the information is readily available in emergency situations. If emergency contacts or phone numbers should change, please let your driver know.
- 6. No food, drink or gum is to be eaten on the bus.
- 7. Please do not send toys, blankets, etc. on the bus unless used in class.

- 8. All buses will be equipped with a cell phone, fire extinguisher, an emergency seat belt cutter, a First Aid kit, and body fluid clean-up kit.
- 9. Appropriate child restraint systems are utilized in our school buses depending on child's weight and size.
- 10. Vehicles cannot back up or do a turn around, except when necessary for reasons of safety or physical barriers. A driver must get prior authorization from the Central Office in order to back up or turn around.
- 11. Due to the Ohio Department of Jobs and Family Services Center Licensing Rules and Regulations we cannot transport siblings (non-Head Start children) on our school buses.

A MESSAGE FOR FAMILIES ABOUT PEDESTRIAN SAFETY

Here are some facts you should know:

- Preschool children are quick and often unaware of danger.
- Each year, many children are injured or killed when they suddenly dart into the path of a car.
- Most preschoolers are injured near their home or on their own street.
- Most crashes involving children happen between 3:00 p.m. and
 6:00 p.m.
- Most crashes involving children occur in fair and warm weather.
- Twice as many preschool boys are injured than preschool girls.

This is How You Can Prevent These Tragedies:

- · Supervise children at all times.
- Children should not be allowed to cross the street alone.
- Teach them who can help them cross the street safely.
- Teach by explaining. Explain to your child the safe way you cross a street. Say: "When I cross a street, I always stop at the curb. I look for cars. I look left for any traffic coming and then I look right for traffic coming that way. Then I look left again. When it is clear, I cross the street and keep looking left and right."
- Teach by example. When you cross a street with your child, always:
 - ★ Stop at the curb.
 - ★ Look LEFT-RIGHT-LEFT for traffic in all directions.
 - ★ Cross when it is clear.
 - ★ Keep looking for cars as you cross.

Encourage your child. As you both safely cross the street together, point out your child's safety behaviors. Use safe language and specific safety words. Practice what you teach at all times.

BUS MONITOR

WE NEED YOU!

CAN YOU HELP ON YOUR CHILD'S BUS BY BEING A BUS MONITOR?

Because we transport preschool children, we are required by the *Federal Head Start Program Performance Standards* (1310.15) to have a monitor on the bus at all times. **We ask that parents volunteer to help us meet this standard**.

1310.15 Operation of Vehicles

(c) Effective January 20, 2004, there will be at least one bus monitor on board at all times, with additional bus monitors provided as necessary, such as when needed to accommodate the needs of children with disabilities. As provided in 45 CFR 1310.2 (a), this paragraph does not apply to transportation services to children served under the homebased option for Head Start and Early Head Start.

The definition of a Bus Monitor is:

"A person with specific responsibilities for assisting the driver in ensuring the safety of children while they ride, board or exit the bus and for assisting the driver during emergencies."

WHAT DOES A BUS MONITOR DO?

- Help the children buckle and un-buckle their safety restraints (seat belts and harnesses). Monitors children during the ride to ensure restraints remain fastened.
- © Remind the children to use their "quiet" voices while inside the bus.
- © Respect the confidentiality of children, families and staff.
- Assist the driver in conducting effective safety drills for children and parents.

- Use bus rides to discuss "happenings" along the way (for example, the first snow, a fire truck going by, the trees that are changing colors, buildings of interest).
- Talk to the children on the bus. Ask what they are going to do at school or what they had for lunch. If they've learned a new song, feel free to sing. You can also read books to the children.
- © The bus driver will have "rules" posted inside the bus to assist you (such as, stay seated with your seatbelt on at all times, use quiet inside voices, no talking at RR Crossings, no eating or drinking food))
- By keeping the bus ride "fun" you are helping teach the children good bus riding habits.
- © If you have questions, feel free to ask your teacher or teacher assistant.

FAMILY SERVICES

NOCAC Child Development is committed to supporting your family by establishing a strong partnership with you. We will help you identify your goals and support you in reaching them by using your own strengths, community resources, networking, and education. This will reinforce the gains made by your child and support your own personal goals and self-sufficiency. NOCAC Family Service Specialists and teachers are available to help with information and resources.


Service opportunities include:

- Home Visits
- A Community Resource Guide
- Emergency or crisis intervention
- Encouragement and support for your own efforts to obtain the quality services you desire
- Development of goals and strategies that you identify as areas for personal growth
- Support for child development, discipline, and stress management issues
- Advocacy for you in dealing with other agencies or individuals
- Information to support your training and educational needs
- Assistance with medical and dental needs
- Translation services for non-English speakers
- Support for fathers and significant males in parenting roles
- Transportation to appointments when needed
- Work with you on your child's absenteeism and develop a plan to ensure good attendance

A home visit from the Teacher will take place before or within your child's first month of school. The purpose of this visit is to start to build a relationship with your family. In your enrollment packet there will be a Family Strengths and Needs assessment that you will need to fill out and give to your Teacher. This assessment will help determine if your family would benefit from additional support and services from the Family

Service Specialist (FSS). Based on the family's interests and needs some families will receive more or less of these services throughout the program year.

For families who would benefit from and are interested in formal goal setting information, referrals, and resources will be provided in response to the goal(s) chosen by the family. Check-ins by phone, site and home visits will be made to check on goal progress throughout the year. Home visits will be scheduled at times that are convenient for parents and staff.



PROVIDING FAMILY SERVICES:

NOCAC Head Start is not only an educational program for your child, but a service which helps your entire family maintain stability and become successful. Our Family Service Specialists (FSS) are assigned a specific caseload and are responsible for assisting you with any needs. Based on your family's interests and needs the FSS may ask to meet with you in order to complete a formal needs assessment two times a program year. If you are placed on the FSS's case load you will be asked to identify strengths and needs for you and your family. After completing the assessment, you will be asked to create family-centered goals. Our staff will have ongoing contact with you and provide any assistance needed to achieve your goals. Other services we can provide include:

- Assisting you in locating and receiving resources in your community.
- Transportation for medical or other necessary appointments when Medicaid transportation is not available.
- Education for positive parenting and life skills.
- · Advocating for you and your family.

If your family is experiencing difficulty in any area and you would like some assistance, feel free to contact the center in your county to speak with the Family Service Specialist. You can also call the Central Office in Defiance at 419-784-2150 to speak with the Family and Community Engagement Manager at extension 1105.

FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

You may already realize that Head Start is not just a program for children. It is also a program for **PARENTS** and **FAMILIES**.

The research says parents/guardians who are supporting and encouraging their child's education strengthen children's success as learners. Head Start wants to support you during this important time. Please let us know how we can help.

Dads we NEED you!

Children do best in life when they grow up with the active, positive involvement of both a mother and father. Whatever the measure — physical and emotional health, educational achievement, behavior, substance abuse, crime or delinquency — children are more likely to lead healthy, productive lives when both their mother and father are actively involved in their lives in positive ways. This is because moms and dads tend to parent differently, at least in some important ways, and their complementary parenting skills and attitudes combine to give children the best environment in which to grow up healthy and successful.

NOCAC HEAD START BELIEVES PARENTS ARE THEIR CHILD'S FIRST AND MOST IMPORTANT TEACHER

We believe parent are the primary educators of their children. This is why our Head Start program strongly encourages parent/guardian engagement from both parents. We understand there are situations when the parents no longer live in the same home, due to divorce or break in the relationship. WE also understand many of these families have court determined custody/visitation arrangements and there may be times the non-custodial, non-residential parent would like to participate and our Head Start/ECE activities. We have an open door policy regarding all of our Child Development programs. This means any parent is welcome to visit our centers (unless there is a documented restraining or no contact order on file) at any time. This notification is to inform you that our staff welcomes parent engagement from both parents' regardless of custody/visitation arrangements and we will allow parent participation in our program, even if this conflicts with the custody/visitation schedule.

We will **NOT** allow the non-custodial, non-residential parent to remove the child from the classroom or our centers property, unless otherwise specified by the primary, custodial parent.

Together We Can:

- Make reading to your child a priority.
- Listen and talk with your child.
- Make class attendance an important choice.

Stay in close communication about your child's development. Get Involved By:

- Reading the newsletters and information Head Start offers.
- Volunteering or observing in your child's classroom.
- Attending Parent Committee Association (PCA) meetings.
- Get involved with Policy Council to share your ideas.



WHICH BRINGS US TO THE YELLOW IN-KIND FORM

Each time you do an <u>At-Home Project</u> that increases your child's school readiness in areas of **MATH**, **SCIENCE**, or **LITERACY**... or anything you do at home <u>on your own</u> – we ask that you put it on your Yellow In-Kind form so we can meet the Federal 20% match.

In-kinds are very important to the Head Start Program. The Federal Head Start grant requires that 20% of the total funding comes from locally matched dollars. What that means is that anyone who volunteers their time, their mileage, goods, etc. NOCAC Head Start can claim that as In-kind towards the needed 20%. If we do not receive the 20% in In-kind, we may lose funding.

Each week a yellow form called an In-kind will be sent home. Please take the time to fill out this form throughout the week with the different activities that we can count. These will be listed at the bottom of the In-kind with a number. Please circle the amount of time that it took for you and your child to complete the activity. We know that it may take some time to complete this form, but without your help we can't make it work!



VOLUNTEER

WE NEED YOUR HELP!



There are many opportunities for parents/family members to grow, learn, and participate in the program. Your time, ideas, and energy will make this a better program for your children. Parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, extended family members, etc. are all invited and encouraged to volunteer as often as possible.

On your Parent/Family Board you will find Volunteer/Visitor ID Badges. If you are interested in observing your child in the classroom put on the red "Family Visitor" badge. If you have time to help in the classroom and want to volunteer your time you can put on the blue "Family Volunteer" Badge. Putting on the badges while in the classroom helps tell your teacher what your intentions are while you are at the center.

Tips for When You Volunteer

- Call if you can't come.
- Sign in upon arrival and sign out before you leave.
- Wear comfortable play clothes (no "R" rated T-shirts).
- Read the daily schedule posted in the room.

- Ask staff questions or for help with any given situation.
- Get involved in the children's activities. Get down on the floor!
- Bend down to child's eye level when speaking.
- Praise and encourage each child's work.
- Use children's names. Do not use descriptive nicknames (ex. "Freckle-face").
- Do not tell a child what to make or how to make things during creative art; provide only as much help as is needed.
- Do not show partiality to the children or staff; avoid comparison or competition.
- Use a soft voice. Stay calm.
- Never leave children alone.
- Let a staff person know about child misbehavior.
- Do not discuss children's behavior or appearance in front of them.
- Do not share information about children/families with anyone other than staff.
- Discuss any differences in opinion with the staff at the end of the day; never in front of the children during class time.
- At the end of the day, meet briefly with the staff to discuss how your day went. SIGN YOUR INKIND SHEET AND SIGN UP TO VOLUNTEER ANOTHER DAY.

We want parents and families to be as involved as they can be!!

Other Ways to Participate and be Involved:

For those of you who cannot volunteer during school hours, here are some activities that can be done at home or after class:

- Create a game rhyming, letter recognition, number recognition, colors, shapes, counting, etc.
- Cut out items for the classroom
- · Collect art items for projects or the collage box
- Collect nature items for children to explore in the discovery area
- Create a book for the class to read (Write the story and then draw pictures to match)
- Find a cooking experience we could do. Help us by creating the recipe chart (we can give you a sample)
- Draw "blueprints" for the block area the children can follow
- · Sew items for the dramatic play area
- Make sock puppets for the library area so children can retell stories
- Research classroom ideas on the internet or at the library

TRANSPORTATION SERVICES FOR FAMILIES

Transportation for Head Start related services are available as a last resort for those families who have no transportation or support system to assist them. Related services can include doctor/dental appointments, locating resources, education services for families, and advocating for you and your family. If you need assistance, please contact your child's teacher or your Family Service Specialist at the center or the Family and Community Engagement Manager at the Central Office, 419-784-2150 ext. 1105.

Buckeye and Paramount Medicaid providers also provide transportation for medical related appointments.

POLICY COUNCIL


This group is made up of parents elected by the NOCAC Head Start Parent Committee Association (PCA). Community representatives and past parents may also serve on Policy Council by contacting the NOCAC Child Development Director. A minimum of 51% of Policy Council membership must be current parents. The general function of Policy Council is:

- A. Serve as a link between other community agencies, the NOCAC Board, and the people it serves;
- B. Initiate suggestions and ideas for program improvements and to receive a report on action in regards to its recommendations;
- C. Plan, coordinate and organize program-wide activities for parents (i.e.: field trips, fundraisers);
- D. Recruit volunteer services from parents, community residents, and community organizations and to mobilize community resources to meet identified needs;
- E. Approve hiring of staff members as well as grant applications and reports.

Policy Council meets once a month. Elected parents are reimbursed for mileage and child care while attending the Policy Council meetings. On-site child care is also available at no charge. Membership on Policy Council is a very important responsibility. Federal and State regulations require parental input into program planning; therefore, once elected, your participation at every meeting is essential. Policy Council members take program information back to the NOCAC Head Start Parent Committee Association (PCA), and bring information from Parent Committee Association to Policy Council. One Policy Council Representative will be elected to serve on the NOCAC Governing Board as a voting member.

Policy Council representatives are elected at the September Parent Committee Association (PCA) meetings and begin at the October Policy

Council meeting. Term of office is October to October. Training is provided.

PCA MEETINGS

PCA meetings will be held according to the date and time decided upon by you, the family and also will be based on need. So the PCA meeting frequency will vary from center to center. An invitation will be sent home to you inviting you to Bring Your Mom/Dad to School Week at your child's center.

Our doors are always open for parents and family members to visit. You do not have to wait for one of these special weeks to come and enjoy seeing your child in his/her learning environment. We are always looking for classroom volunteers.

CHILD DEVELOPMENT NEWSLETTER

You will receive a Newsletter from the Central Office at the beginning of each month. The newsletter contains the month's coming events, parenting/child development articles, information and recipes. If you find an item of interest or anything you wish to share with other parents, give it to a staff person for possible publication in the newsletter. Items should be turned in by the **10th of the month** for the next month's newsletter.



EDUCATION SERVICES

Lesson Plans — NOCAC uses the Creative Curriculum to guide our environment and lesson plans. The curriculum focuses on the following areas of development and learning: social/emotional, physical, cognitive, language, literacy, mathematics, science and technology, social studies, and the arts (English language acquisition if applicable). Your child will experience the following each day: large group (circle time), small group, at least 2 books/stories, free play, and a planned outdoor activity. Please refer to the lesson plan or talk to your child's teacher to discuss what happens throughout your child's day.

Cooking Experiences — your child will have the opportunity to participate in a cooking experiences. This will allow your child to practice the following skills throughout the year: cutting, mixing, spreading, measuring, peeling/shredding, baking, ingredients changing form, and exposure to cooking appliances (toaster, blender, griddle, crock pot, etc.)

Field Trips — your child will have the opportunity to participate in field trips away from the site throughout the year. You will always be notified in advance through newsletters and verbal contact. We encourage parents to join their child on these field trip days! Staff/child ratio on all field trips will be a minimum of 1:9. In order to meet safe ratios, parent participation is essential on some field trips. Field Trip Permission Slips will be signed for each child by their parent prior to the field trip and Child Health and Enrollment forms for all children will be kept at hand by staff at all times.

Classroom Newsletter — you will receive a classroom newsletter written by your child's teacher each month. It will include important dates, what will be happening in the classroom, suggestions of activities for you and your child to try at home and volunteering options for the center and at home.

Home Visits and Conferences — your child's teacher will contact you twice a year to schedule a home visit and twice a year to schedule a conference. These meetings will give time to discuss your child's progress with the teacher in addition to reminders, upcoming dates, important information, etc. We will work to meet your needs if you are unable to travel to the school. Families will not have a consequence due to lack of attendance. Please take this opportunity to ask and answer questions to assist us in providing the best education for your child.

HOLIDAYS AND OTHER SPECIAL DAYS

Holidays and other special days are held at approximately the same time as the public schools and you will need to watch the newsletter for the correct dates. Your child's teacher will also tell you when classes won't be held.

In the classroom, your child may participate in holiday songs, books, or educational experiences. In an effort to respect all beliefs, we focus more on seasonal activities and celebrations (ex: Fall Festival, Winter Celebration). Characters such as Santa and the Easter Bunny will not be visiting the classrooms. Please do not send holiday specific treats, activities, or cards with your child. Special events will be noted in the newsletter.

KINDERGARTEN TRANSITION

We would like your child's transition to kindergarten to be as smooth as possible for both you and your child. The following will happen to assist in the process.

- 1. Your child's teacher will observe a kindergarten classroom and discuss what the kindergarten teachers expect from the children.
- 2. Your child will attend a kindergarten visit to experience the new environment. This will give him/her an idea of what to expect and prepare you also. We encourage you to attend this field trip.
- 3. You will receive transition information at the last conference and last home visit to review and discuss with your child's teacher.
- 4. You will receive a list of schools in the area with their screening dates and information in advance.
- 5. The newsletter will contain articles to better prepare you and your child for the transition from preschool to kindergarten

CREATIVE ACTIVITY RECIPES

Clean Mud

4 rolls toilet paper

1 gallon warm water

3 cups Ivory Snow

2 drops wintergreen mint flavoring

old newspapers

Let the children help unroll the toilet paper. Cover the area with newspapers. Mix soap and water together in a bucket. Add toilet paper and allow paper to absorb the soap mixture. This mixture keeps at least one month. You can color this mixture by using food coloring (color the water prior to adding the toilet paper).

Silly Putty

2 parts Elmer's glue

1 part liquid starch

Combine ingredients and mix. At first mixture will be sticky and stringy; keep adding liquid starch until mixture can be handled without sticking to your hands. Food coloring may be added.

Silly Putty will last longer if it's stored in the refrigerator.

Finger Paint

1 cup cool water ½ cup cornstarch food coloring

Combine water and cornstarch. Boil until thick. Add food coloring or Tempera paint.

Play dough

1 cup water

food coloring

½ cup salt

1 Tb alum or cream of tartar

1 Tb oil

1 cup flour

Combine water, food coloring, salt, oil, and alum. Heat until boil. Add flour. Remove from heat and knead until smooth.



VOLUNTEER GUIDANCE

POSITIVE APPROACH

We Use a Positive Approach When Directing a Child, So Can You!

Children accept positive direction best so here are a few examples of how to redirect a child in a positive way.

- Observe children on equipment
- Be near slide or other equipment to help children go up and down

THE "END OF THE YEAR CELEBRATION"

Why do we at NOCAC Child Development choose an "End of the Year Celebration" instead of a "Formal Graduation"?

Young children have different interests, abilities and skill levels. If young children are pushed to do things before they are ready, they may experience failure and as a result their self-esteem will suffer. Young children may feel anxious when in front of a group. If young children become anxious they may think that they are not capable of succeeding. We feel a "Formal Graduation" is inappropriate for young children.

We choose instead, to have an "End of the Year Celebration". At Head Start we strive to give as many opportunities as possible for the children to feel success. When activities are matched to their abilities the children develop self-confidence in a safe and accepting atmosphere. In this way young children develop a good feeling of competence and self-esteem.

It is important that parents & staff work together to plan developmentally appropriate activities for the "End of the Year Celebration".

MENTAL HEALTH/BEHAVIOR SERVICES

CONSCIOUS DISCIPLINE

Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission (NOCAC) Head Start staff are being trained in the philosophy of Conscious Discipline®, and will utilize the principles of this philosophy as they work to help children manage their behaviors. At all times, the agency will make every effort to ensure the safety of children and staff.

- ★ In extreme cases involving lack of safety, a child may have their hours reduced or schedule modified based on the needs of that child, or be removed from the classroom and a home based option offered if appropriate.
- * Each situation is handled on a case by case basis.
- ★ Employees are trained in the Behavior Management Policy and it is applicable to all employees of NOCAC Head Start.

Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission (NOCAC) uses Conscious Discipline®, written by Dr. Becky Bailey, as the framework for classroom and behavior management. This philosophy, based on current brain research and sound knowledge of child development, focuses on helping children feel emotionally *safe* and *connected* with others. When this is accomplished, children are better able to learn, remember what they have learned and are more *willing* to cooperate. At NOCAC Head Start, we do this by striving to build a healthy School Family™ within our classrooms, centers and agency. Conscious Discipline® views all conflicts and problems as opportunities to learn and teach. Each child in our NOCAC Head Start School Family™ has the opportunity to learn the skills needed to successfully manage life challenges as they occur throughout the daily routine with the guidance provided by our trained teaching staff.

Conscious Discipline® empowers our staff with the Seven Powers for self control.

These are:

- 1. The Power of Perception: No one can make you angry without your permission
- 2. The Power of Attention: What you focus on you get more of

- 3. The Power of Free Will: The only person you can change is vourself
- 4. The Power of Unity: Focus on connecting instead of trying to be special
- 5. The Power of Love: See the best in one another
- 6. The Power of Acceptance: The moment is what it is
- 7. The Power of Intention: Conflict is an opportunity to teach

These powers change how adults respond to conflict and help them to be more effective at helping children begin to learn to self regulate their emotions. What makes Conscious Discipline® different than all other behavior management programs is that it starts with the adult. In order to be effective in helping children change or improve their behavior it is important for the adult to be conscious of their own behavior and the intention behind their behavior—thus, be the adult that they want the children to become.

For children who exhibit chronic behavior challenges, NOCAC Head Start utilizes Conscious Discipline® as the blueprint for the intervention process that also includes parent and teacher input.

Be a S.T.A.R. Smile, <u>T</u>ake a deep breath <u>A</u>nd Relax

CHILD GUIDANCE

Developmentally appropriate guidance demonstrates respect for children. Proper guidance helps children develop self control and find solutions to classroom conflicts/crisis.

Children learn self-control when NOCAC employees treat them with dignity and use child guidance techniques such as:

- ★ Setting clear, consistent, fair limits for classroom behavior (indoors and outdoors)
- ★ Valuing mistakes as learning techniques
- ★ Re-directing children to more acceptable behavior or activity
- ★ Listening when children talk about their feelings and frustrations
- ★ Guiding children to resolve conflicts and modeling skills that help children solve their own problems
- ★ Patiently reminding children of rules and their rationale as needed
- ★ Modeling desired behavior
- **★** Focusing on appropriate behaviors

When a severe behavior problem occurs, a Behavior Plan will be put into action involving parents and your child's teacher and center manager with the Mental Health/Behavior Specialist facilitating.

BEHAVIOR PLAN

NOCAC Head Start partners with the Four County Family Center for mental health referrals and individual child observations. Maumee Valley Guidance Center is also used as a referral source and provides guidance for mental health concerns. The Local Education Agency (LEA's) will also be included if a suspected developmental delay is identified through our screening procedures.

If there are behaviors seen in the classroom, your child's teacher will contact you and either ask that you come into the center for a meeting or will discuss the issues over the phone. During this conversation or meeting you and the teacher will discuss possible interventions to try at home and in the classroom for your child. You may also be asked to fill

out a screening tool, similar to the one you filled out at the beginning of the year. After 2 weeks, if the behavior has not improved or has gotten worse, your child's teacher will contact you to get your permission to make an internal referral to the Head Start Mental Health/Behavior Specialist. After the internal referral is made, the Mental Health/Behavior Specialist will contact you to set up a meeting time. Head Start staff will attempt to contact you 5 times before going ahead with the meeting without a guardian present. At the Behavior Team Meeting it will be you, your child's teacher, the site manager and the Mental Health/Behavior Specialist and possibly the FSS. At this meeting the Mental Health/Behavior Specialist will bring the Behavior Plan for intensified, specific interventions for your child in the classroom and at home. At this meeting, outside counseling referrals will be discussed, along with one on one counseling with the Head Start Mental Health/Behavior Specialist. After the meeting, your child's teacher and Mental Health/Behavior Specialist will keep in contact with you about your child's progress and behavior in the classroom. If the behavior continues after 6 weeks of time, another meeting will be held and more serious options will be given to the family for safety reasons.

- **The plan can be modified at anytime if your child is expressing severe, unsafe behavior in the classroom.
- **If you want an outside counseling referral for your child at anytime, please call the Mental Health/Behavior Specialist or let your child's teacher know.



MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

It is important to know that when one family member has a mental health need, every member of the family is affected.

Head Start employs a Mental Health Specialist. The specialist provides guidance and services for children, parents, and staff through observations, trainings, home-visits, one on one work and referrals. Throughout the program year, the consultant may observe an individual child at the request of a parent or teacher.

If you have a mental health concern about your child, contact your NOCAC Head Start Family Service Specialist or Erin Schmidt (Mental Health/Behavior Specialist) at 419-784-2150 ext. 1128. You will complete a Social/Emotional Screening (ASQ-SE2) as well as help your child's teacher to assist in indentifying strategies to promote your child's social/emotional development.

HEALTH SERVICES

PHYSICAL & DENTAL REQUIREMENTS

The goal of the health component is to provide a comprehensive health program for all children enrolled in the Head Start and Preschool Programs. The belief that unless children are in a state of good health, they will not be able to fulfill their learning potential is the guiding philosophy of the health component. This health program includes health education for children and their families.

- NOCAC Head Start and ECE programs <u>recommend that each child</u> <u>enrolled have current physicals completed or scheduled before</u> <u>they attend their first day of class</u>. Physicals and dentals are current for 13 months.
- If the physical exam is not completed and at the center by the child's 30th day of enrollment, the child may not ATTEND THE CENTER and will receive weekly home visits only until the physical form is received.
- Children who have physicals that come due during the program year must have a current physical on file within 13 months of the original physical date, or they may not attend at the center.

 Our program also requires a dental exam. It too, must be renewed every 13 months. If your child's dental exam shows a need for further dental work, we will remind you, help you with travel if necessary, and work with you to get it completed.

A CHILD WITH DENTAL NEEDS IS MOST LIKELY IN PAIN AND WE MUST HELP HIM ASAP. You are expected to follow-up promptly.

It is your responsibility to take your child to the doctor and dentist appointments; however, assistance is available for transportation or other issues that may arise. You will be notified of all results. If your child needs further evaluations, we will assist you in obtaining referral services. If for some reason your child will not be able to have the physical or dental completed before the first day of class, the Child Health and Safety Manager needs to be notified at 419-784-2150 ext. 1118.



You and your child will receive health and nutrition education about dental health, personal hygiene, safety, nutrition, and child safety. Health and nutrition education is provided for you at training days, parent meetings, and at your request. A Health Advisory Committee (HAC) made up of staff, medical providers, and parents, meet at a minimum of one time per program year to review the health services program.

Medical and dental emergency procedures are posted in each classroom.

Your child must have one lead screening and one Hematocrit or hemoglobin screen during their 0-5 years and we need the results of those screenings. When your child goes for a physical exam, be sure to remind your doctor to do those screens also.

ILLNESS POLICY

When Should I Keep My Child Home?

If the child has 2 or more indicators listed below:

- a temperature of 100 degrees F or above;
- · vomits within the 12-hour period before the bus picks the child up;
- diarrhea within the 24-hour period before the bus picks the child up;
- a common cold with a lot of nasal discharge or green nasal discharge;
- a cough that is hacking or continuous;
- Streptococcal throat infection child is to remain home until 24 hours after antibiotic is started;
- is complaining of an ear ache (child needs to be seen by a physician);
- skin sores which are open and draining or any skin diseases (impetigo, scabies, 5th disease, pinworms, ringworm, etc.) or unknown rashes;
- live lice. (Call the teacher if this is the reason for non-attendance).





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COMMUNICABLE ILLNESS POLICY

- A. Communicable diseases are illnesses caused by infection with specific germs viruses, bacteria, fungi, or parasites. Contagious or communicable diseases are infectious diseases that can spread from one person to another.
- B. A child with any of the following signs or symptoms of illness will be immediately isolated and the parent will be called to pick up their child from school:
 - Temperature: temperatures of 100 degrees or greater, along with behavior changes or other signs or symptoms of illness.
 - 2) Signs of possible severe illness: unusual lethargy, irritability, persistent crying, difficult or rapid breathing, uncontrolled coughing, yellowish skin or eyes, unusually dark urine and/or gray or white stool, stiff neck with elevated temperature, sore throat or difficulty swallowing.
 - 3) <u>Uncontrolled diarrhea</u>: an increased number of stools compared with the child's normal pattern, loose, watery stools, often accompanied by nausea and/or abdominal cramps.
 - 4) <u>Vomiting</u>: more than one time or when accompanied by any other sign or symptom of illness.
 - 5) <u>Severe coughing:</u> causing the child to become red or blue in the face or to make a whooping sound.
 - 6) Mouth sores: with drooling unless the child's physician or local health department authority states the child is noninfectious.
 - 7) Rash: until a physician has determined the illness is not a communicable disease.
 - 8) Purulent conjunctivitis: defined as pink or red conjunctiva with white or yellow eye discharge, often with matted eyelids after sleep, and including a child with eye pain or redness of the eyelids or skin surrounding the eye, until 24 hours after treatment begins.
 - 9) <u>Infestation</u>: a) Scabies must stay out until 24 hours after treatment was begun.

- b) Lice or Nits if a child has either lice or nits or both, they must stay home until the child has been treated with lice shampoo and the child is free from live lice. Staff must assist the parents with procedures to clear the child's hair and environment. The Health and Safety Manager will assist staff and parents in this process as needed. c) Ringworm or d) Pinworm
- 10) <u>Tuberculosis</u>: until the physician or local health department authority states the child is noninfectious.
- 11) Impetigo: until 24 hours after treatment was begun.
- 12) <u>Streptococcal Pharyngitis (Strep Throat)</u>: until 24 hours after treatment has been initiated and fever is gone.
- 13) <u>Varicella (Chicken Pox)</u>: until six (6) days after onset of rash or until all lesions have been dried and crusted.
- 14) <u>Shingles</u>: only if the sores cannot be covered by clothing or a dressing, until the sores have crusted.
- 15) Pertussis (Whopping Cough): which is laboratory confirmed, or suspected based on symptoms of the illness, or suspected because of cough onset within 14 days after having face-to-face contact with a laboratory confirmed case of pertussis in a household or classroom, until five (5) days of appropriate medication has been completed.
- 16) Mumps: until nine (9) days after onset of parotid gland swelling.
- 17) <u>Hepatitis A Virus Infection</u>: until one (1) week after onset of illness or until after immune serum globulin has been given to appropriate children and staff in the program, as directed by the responsible health department.
- 18) Measles: until six (6) days after rash appears,
- 19) Rubella (German Measles): until six (6) days after rash appears,
- 20) Fifth Disease: until six (6) days after rash appears,
- 21) <u>Pneumonia</u>

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- C. A current Ohio Communicable Disease Chart (JFS 08087) revised 4/2009 or 9/2009 is posted in the centers for quick reference by trained personnel.
- D. Parents of all Head Start/ECE children will be notified either verbally or in writing of all communicable infectious illnesses in the classroom. Parents will be given written information which lists instructions and symptoms of the infectious illness to aid them in identifying.
- E. Children who are mildly ill (slightly above normal temperature; appears to be listless, but without an elevated temperature, etc.) but cannot be transported home, will be observed throughout the remainder of the day for signs of a more serious illness or ones that are listed on the Communicable Disease Chart. The parent/guardian will be contacted immediately and told of the child's behavior/symptoms and be requested to continue observing their child for further signs of a more serious condition. Staff must contact the Health and Safety Manager and send a completed Child Observation form to the Central Office within 24 hours.
- F. Children who demonstrate signs of illness and are suspected of having a communicable illness will be isolated and observed. Staff will contact the parent or legal guardian about the child's

- condition. When a child is isolated he/she will be kept within sight and hearing of a staff member. The child will be made comfortable on a cot. The cot and any linen used will be washed and disinfected before being used again.
- G. If a child does not feel well enough to participate in all center activities, the parent will be contacted to pick-up the child.
- H. Children on antibiotics prescribed by a physician will be kept at home for a minimum of 24 hours after the first dose.
- 1. Children with short-term injury or contagious illness are temporarily excluded from program activities only when they cannot be readily accommodated for program participation or there is a significant risk to the health or safety of the child or anyone in contact with the child. Any child absent from the center due to illness for more than three (3) school days may be required to provide proof from a physician releasing him/her to school.
- J. A quick "health check" is done by a person trained through orientation and Red Cross Common Childhood Illness training to recognize the signs of communicable illness as each child enters the bus or classroom.
- K. All center staff/employees are required to abide by the same policy relating to communicable illness as the children are. Staff who are not able to work because of illness will have qualified substitutes in their place.
- L. All staff are trained in hand washing and disinfection procedures at the Health Service orientation by their supervisor or designated trainer.

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HANDWASHING PROCEDURE

Staff, Volunteers and Children:

- Wash hands with soap upon arrival.
- Wash hands with soap before preparing foods, eating, or feeding children.
- Wash hands with soap after toileting self or a child, handling body secretions (e.g. changing diapers, cleaning up a child who has vomited or spit up, wiping a child's nose, handling soiled clothing or other contaminated items). Post signs to remind staff, volunteers and children to wash their hands.
- Be sure that the hot water supplied to fixtures accessible to children does not exceed a maximum temperature of 120°F.

How to Wash Hands:

- Check to be sure a paper towel is available. Turn on water to a comfortable temperature.
- Moisten hands with water and apply heavy lather of liquid soap. For children, a drop of liquid soap is sufficient.
- Wash well under running water for at least ten (15) seconds.
- Pay particular attention to areas between fingers, around nail beds, under fingernails, and back of hands.
- Rinse well under running water until free of soap and dirt. Hold hands so that water flows from wrist to fingertips.
- Dry hands with paper towel.
- Use paper towel to turn off faucet and discard towel.
- Teach older children to carry out the procedure themselves.
- Supervise younger children in carrying out the procedure.

IMMUNIZATIONS

The Head Start/Preschool programs require that all children enrolled in the program have up-to-date immunizations. Immunizations are important for children because they will protect against diseases that can hurt, cripple, and sometimes even kill a young child.

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ADMINISTERING MEDICATION/TREATMENT POLICY

The only time medication, asthma treatments, vitamins, or over the counter medication will be administered to any child in the center is when a signed, written, dated order is issued by a licensed physician, an advanced practice nurse, or licensed dentist. It is first the responsibility of the parent/guardian to administer any needed medication and/or treatment to their child. Arrangements will be made for parents/guardians to come to the center to administer to their child. Only when deemed necessary will child development staff administer any medication and/or treatment. In all cases, the Parent/Guardian Request for the Administration of Medication and Medical Care Form must be completed and signed before we can receive or administer any medications or treatments. The completed forms will be forwarded to the Health & Safety Manager. Copies of each form will be kept in the central office file and the original forms will be kept in the child's center file. New forms must be completed whenever the physician changes an order for medication/treatment.

- 1. Only trained staff may give a child medicine/treatment. They must sign the Administration of Medication form each time.
- 2. All medicines must have original labeling and carry the following basic information:
 - The name of the child who will be getting the medicine.
 - The name of the child's doctor.
 - The name of the medicine and expiration date, the dosage.
 - A current date (within the last 12 months).
 - Storage requirements (example: cool, dark, dry place, refrigeration).
- 3. Store all medicines safely in child-proof locked containers, out of reach of children.
- 4. Discard or return to parents/guardian any unused medicine.
- 5. Prepare and attempt to give medicines out of the sight of other children.
- 6. Always read the label before giving medicine.
- 7. Never call medicine "candy".

- 8. Never leave a container of medicine out where children can reach it.
- 9. Always log date of dosage, amount and time of dosage with your signature in Section III of Administration of Medication form.
- 10. The authorized staff giving medicine/treatment will not delegate the task or responsibility to another staff. No one whose name is not on the Administration of Medication from may give a child medication.
- 11. All medications must be given directly to center personnel for immediate safe storage.
- 12. The Request for Administration of Medication form will be fully completed and signed before any medication is given. Staff administering the medication must complete the back of the form each time medication is given.
- 13. If for any reason, medication or treatments are not administered, delayed, or incorrectly administered; staff will contact/notify the parent immediately for further instructions. Staff must complete the Incident/Injury Report (JFS 01299) and report the incident to their immediate supervisor and the Health and Safety Manager.

TRANSPORTING MEDICINE ON THE BUS

The parent or guardian must bring the medicine into the center and give it directly to their child's teacher and complete the paperwork before we can accept the medication.

Only the transportation of emergency medication will be permitted on the NOCAC bus.

Drivers and monitors must not carry personal medications with them on the bus. Staff medication is stored in the site's office in a locked file or locker.

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DENTAL CARE

The care of your child's first teeth is very important and has an effect on his/her permanent teeth. The baby teeth hold the position for the permanent teeth to come in correctly. Baby teeth are needed for chewing and speech development. Gauze should be used to wipe off an infant's gums. Parents should assist their children in brushing teeth at an early age. Teeth should be brushed well three times a day. Limit sticky and high sugar content food.

All Head Start age children are required to receive a dental exam and needed follow up care. Parents are sometimes reluctant to get the follow-up work done thinking, "It's only a baby tooth, they'll lose it one day anyway."

Since a baby tooth is so small, it doesn't take long for a cavity to take over the entire tooth. This will become painful in time. It's a much more positive experience for the child to visit the dentist when feeling well than when in pain. An abscessed tooth puts infection into the body which will spread to other areas of the head and body. The decayed baby tooth can spread to the permanent tooth causing it to come in decayed. It is also likely to cause the child pain.

A special form of tooth decay in children between 18 months and 3 years of age is baby bottle mouth. This happens when a child is given sugary liquids in a bottle and when a baby is laid down with a bottle, even with milk or formula in it. The results are brownish teeth which are easily broken off, sometimes even with the gum line. This can be painful and gives the child little substance to chew with. They also affect a child's appearance and self-esteem. **Never put a baby to bed with a bottle!**

Make the child's visit to the dentist a pleasant one. Avoid negative talk like, "Don't be afraid. The dentist isn't going to hurt you." or "Don't be a baby." This is a new experience for your child. It's okay if he/she is a little afraid. Say things like, "The dentist takes care of little boy's and girl's teeth." Positive early dental experiences will lead to continued good dental care in his/her life. Dentistry has come a long way from those painful experiences you may have had as a child. Try not to pass on any feelings from a past negative experience you had.

Remember, always keep your appointment or call in advance if you must cancel.

If you need to contact a dentist, have Medicaid or no insurance of any kind and want to receive a reduced fee, call the Bryan Community Health Center. Their number is 567-239-4562.



** Children should be encouraged to brush their teeth after every meal. We practice brushing teeth every day.

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Child Development studies have shown that meal or snack time is a prime opportunity to teach children about foods and nutrition. Adult-child interactions determine the child's acceptance of food and attitudes toward eating. Meal time should be a relaxed, enjoyable experience; one that encourages talking and sharing. A pleasant, relaxed meal time atmosphere is beneficial to digestion and attributes to good eating habits.

Head Start Nutrition Program Goals:

- ✓ Provide needed nutrients through well planned meals.
- ✓ Provide a variety of food and eating experiences.
- ✓ Provide opportunities for children/families to participate in menu planning and in simple food preparation and selection.
- ✓ Provide the opportunity to consult with a nutritionist whenever a nutrition related concern is detected.

Nutrition and Menu Requirements:

- 1. Every child in a part-day program will receive a quantity of food in meals (preferably hot) and snacks which provide at least 1/3 of the Recommended Daily Intake set by the United States Department of Agriculture.
- 2. Foods chosen for meals and snacks will contribute not only to the child's nutrient needs but also to good dental health and support the dental education program.
- 3. Foods high in refined sugars will not be served to the children.

- 4. Cake, rolls, pastries, doughnuts, sugar coated cereals, etc., because of their sweet and sticky nature, are not supportive of Head Start dental health education and are not served in the menus. We ask that parents do not bring cupcakes, cookies, or other home baked items to the center. See "Special Occasions" on page 40.
- 5. Fruit drinks and beverages made from fruit flavored powders or syrups are not acceptable. They do not contain the vitamins and minerals found in natural juices. Only 100% fruit juice is served and kept to a minimum.
- 6. Menus include a source of Vitamin C. Excellent sources include oranges, grapefruit, and their juices, broccoli, cantaloupe, raw tomatoes and raw strawberries, kale, spinach, cauliflower, tangerine, tomato juice, and raw cabbage.
- 7. A dark yellow or leafy green vegetable is served every other day to provide Vitamin A. Fruits and vegetables that are good sources of Vitamin A include sweet potatoes, carrots, broccoli, winter squash, apricots, peaches, tomatoes, cantaloupe, and spinach.
- 8. USDA Income Eligibility forms must be completed for every child enrolled in the Public Preschool options. These forms ensure reimbursement for the meals children receive. Head Start children are automatically eligible. All families must enroll their child in our food program.
- Because our standard is to help children enjoy a variety of natural foods, we do not add salt, sugar, or extra fat to our food.
- 10. If your child needs a special diet, you will complete paperwork, including a doctor's signature verifying any food allergy which eliminates an entire food group and examples of what is acceptable as substitutions for a special diet or food allergy.

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CHILD AND ADULT CARE FOOD PROGRAM

NOCAC centers participate in the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP), a Federal program that provides healthy meals and snacks to children receiving day care. Each day more than 2.6 million children participate in CACFP at child care homes and centers across the country. Providers are reimbursed for serving nutritious meals which meet USDA requirements. The program plays a vital role in improving the quality of day care and making it more affordable for low-income families.

Participating Facilities — Many different homes and centers operate CACFP and share the common goal of bringing nutritious meals and snacks to participants. Participating facilities include:

- Child Care Centers: Licensed or approved public or private nonprofit child care centers, Head Start programs, and some for-profit centers.
- Family Child Care Homes: Licensed or approved private homes.
- After School Care Programs: Centers in low-income areas provide free snacks to school-age children and youth.
- Emergency Shelters: Programs providing meals to homeless children.

Eligibility — State agencies reimburse facilities that offer non-residential day care to the following children:

- Children age 12 and under,
- Migrant children age 15 and younger, and
- Youths through 18 in emergency shelters and after school care programs in needy areas.

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MEALS AND SNACKS

CENTER - Menus are posted on the parent board and in the kitchen. Each child attending the center will be provided with a nutritious breakfast or snack (depending on session) and a balanced lunch which supplies at least 1/3 of the child's recommended daily intake. Menus are also sent home to parents regularly.

CACFP — Child and Adult Care Food Program is a Federal program that provides reimbursement to our agency for providing healthy meals and snacks to children in our program. You may receive a CACFP application form to be returned to the center. All families must sign an enrollment form.

HOME BASE - Children will have a Cooking Experience brought to their home by the home visitor once each month. The day the children have group Socialization for 2½ hours, they will be fed a meal which supplies 1/3 of the child's recommended daily intake.

FOOD SUBSTITUTIONS - If your child has allergies, diabetes or any other need for a special diet, you must get a request from your doctor. Without the doctor's request we cannot make any substitutions. Modifications to a child's diet, for religious reasons, will be accepted only upon receipt of a written request by the child's parent prior to meal preparation.

MENU CHANGES - Whenever possible, the cooks will follow the posted menus. Sometimes because certain foods are unavailable or there is a change in the schedule, the cooks may have to change the menu. Changes will be kept to a minimum and any/all changes will be noted on all menus at the time of the change or sooner.

If your child requires special food or menu changes; you will complete a Medical Care Plan form to inform us of his/her need. You will need to sign a release for your child's doctor to talk with us. This is so we know we are following his orders correctly. Always advise your child's teacher of food allergies before your child attends.

CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES - If a child has a special need or disability, the arrangement and adjustment needed are taken into account to fit the situation.

special occasions - We cannot control the way food is prepared at parents' or staff members' homes and have children enrolled in our centers who have food allergies or other dietary restrictions, therefore parents may not make any type of food as treats for birthdays and/or other special occasions. Staff knows about any restrictions in the class and can give you ideas for treats that all the children can enjoy.

Our local Health Department does not allow us to serve foods cooked outside the center unless packaged for sale.

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RECIPES

AFTER THANKSGIVING TURKEY SOUP

1 leftover turkey carcass

3 med. Onions, chopped

2 large carrots, chopped

2 celery ribs, diced

1 cup butter cubed

1 cup flour (all purpose)

2 cups half & half (low fat)

1 c. uncooked long grain rice

2 tsp. salt

¾ tsp. pepper

1 tsp. chicken bouillon granules

Step 1 — Place turkey carcass in Dutch oven or soup kettle and cover with water, bring to boil, simmer for 1 hour. Remove turkey bones and save 3 quarts of broth. Remove turkey from bones.

Step 2 – In soup kettle, sauté onions, carrots, celery in butter until tender. Reduce heat, stir in flour until blended. Gradually add 1 quart of reserved broth. Bring to boil, cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened.

Step 3 – Add cream, rice, salt, bouillon, pepper and remaining broth and turkey meat. Reduce heat, cover and simmer for 30-35 minutes (or until rice is tender).

RAINBOW CHIPS

Prep. Time: 30 mins.

Preheat oven to 375° F. Peel and thinly slice 1 cup root vegetables (like beets, parsnips, and celery root). Remove excess liquid from beets with paper towels; allow to stand 15 minutes. Toss with 1 tsp. olive oil and lightly sprinkle with salt. Bake on a cookie sheet in a single layer for the following times: Beets (bake for 10 minutes, remove and let stand 5 minutes, then bake 8 to 10 minutes more or until no longer wet), parsnips (23 minutes), and celery root (28 minutes). Cool parsnips and celery root on baking sheet; beets on thin paper towels. Store in a container.

Tip:

Store cooled chips in airtight container for up to 24 hours. If necessary, re-crisp chips in a $325\,^\circ$ F oven for 3 to 4 minutes.

PUMPKIN PROTEIN CHEESECAKE MOUSSE

Ingredients:

1 cup low-fat or fat-free cottage cheese

½ cup pumpkin puree

14 cup milk of choice

1 TBS. sugar-free instant butterscotch (or vanilla) dry pudding mix

½ tsp. pumpkin pie spice

½ tsp. cinnamon

3-6 packets Stevia, or to taste (or sweetener of choice to taste)

Optional toppings:

Gingersnaps, light whip cream

Directions:

Place everything in a blender, and blend until smooth. Serve immediately or cover and place in the refrigerator until chilled — at least one hour. Top with light whip cream and/or crushed gingersnap cookies if desired.

SNOW ICE CREAM



1 can Carnation sweetened condensed milk
½ cup sugar dash of salt
1 tsp. vanilla 1 egg, beaten

clean snow (light fluffy snow works best)



Mix the first four ingredients together. Gently mix in the snow until it is "ice cream consistency."

SAUSAGE CASSEROLE

Ingredients:

1 lb. sausage – uncooked

I cup instant rice - uncooked

32 oz. stewed tomatoes (undrained)

16 oz. green beans (drained)

Directions:

Preheat the oven to 350 $^{\circ}$ F. Spray a 13 X 9" pan with cooking spray. Layer in the pan in this order — sausage, green beans, rice, and tomatoes. Add salt and pepper on top if desired. Bake for 1 hour.

DISABILITIES AND INTERVENTION SERVICES

WHY SCREEN?

What's a developmental screening?

Developmental screening is a way of looking at your child's development in comparison to other children his or her age. It shows parents if their child is developing within the normal range for his or her age and in what areas the child may need help. Screening also measures your child's abilities in the area of motor skills, concept or cognitive skills and language development.

If your child is developing more slowly than expected in one or more areas, activities will be suggested that can be used to strengthen your child's skills in that area. We may recommend screening your child again later in the year. If necessary, suggestions for further evaluation will be made.

The results of this screening don't determine placement. The information from this screening is used in planning activities for your child, organizing the classroom or center, and selecting toys and materials.

What other assessments are done with my child?

As well as needing to know your child's skills and abilities at the time of entry into our program, Head Start measures each child's progress throughout the year. This information is shared with you at Home Visits and Parent/Teacher Conferences, using Teaching Strategies Gold progress reports.

SERVICES FOR CHILDREN WHO HAVE SPECIAL NEEDS

The earlier a child's needs are identified and assistance is given, the better he/she will succeed in school. All children attending the NOCAC Head Start Program are provided with individualized care and guidance to help them reach their full potential. Some children require special services in addition to the regular program. Head Start staff will help parents obtain those services.

Head Start seeks to enroll children with disabilities. It is a valuable preschool experience when children with disabilities and typically developing children learn to respect one another and their differences.

SPECIAL EDUCATION IEP

If your child has an Individual Education PROGRAM (IEP), it is important that you get a copy of the Evaluation Team Report(ETR) which shows all test results and the IEP to your child's teacher as soon as possible. Your child's teacher or the center's Family Service Specialist (FSS) may help you in making/obtaining the copies. Staff are required to address existing IEP goals within the first two weeks of your child's enrollment date so it is important that your child's teacher has this information.

NOTICE OF PARENTS' RIGHTS OF IEP PROCESS

All children who enter the Head Start Program receive physicals and other health screenings to make sure they are healthy and are developing normally. Some children will need additional or special services from NOCAC Child Development to help meet any needs which are uncovered by these physicals and screenings.

You Have the Right:

To give your written OK before any information is shared with the Head Start Program, and before Head Start gives other agencies any information on your child.

You Have the Right:

To be a part of the Evaluation Team and to give them your observations and information about your child. If you like, you may bring someone with you to speak for you or to help you in the meeting. If you can't come to a meeting, you may request the meeting to be rescheduled at a time that works for you. You may also send your child to different doctors or specialists for another physical or other tests and share the results with the team.

You Have The Right:

To have your child's ETR finished in a timely manner.

To give or not give your written OK for these plans.

To be given a copy of the Team's written plan for your child.

To ask questions of anyone at the meeting

To take the plan with you so that you can discuss your issues or gain better understanding of the plan

You can request another meeting with the ETR/IEP Team to talk over the plans and the reasons you do not agree with them. You may bring someone with you to help you during this meeting.


YOU HAVE THE RESPONSIBILITY TO

- Go to as many of the IEP/ETR Team Meetings as possible.
- Ask questions whenever you don't understand what is being said or done, or whenever you are concerned about how your child is acting or learning.
- Share your observations about your child with the Team, as well as any changes in the family which might affect your child in the center.
- Try to carry out those activities which the Team suggests would be helpful to your child when he is at home, and report back the effect these activities have on him.

SUMMER FOOD SERVICE PROGRAM

The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) was established to ensure that low-income children continue to receive nutritious meals when school is not in session. Free meals, that meet Federal nutrition guidelines, are provided to all children at approved SFSP sites in areas with significant concentrations of low-income children.



Children ages 1-18 (to 21 with IEP) are provided a nutritious lunch from mid-June to mid-August.

Children can participate in provided educational or recreational activities or programs, meet other children and have lots of fun.

Parents stretch food dollars and have healthy recreation for their children during the summer months.

GRIEVANCE (CONCERN, COMPLAINT, PROBLEM) PROCEDURE

From time to time parents are unhappy with the way services are provided or other situations that arise during the course of the year. If you are unhappy with a situation in your child's center we encourage you to: 1) discuss this with your child's teacher or the center supervisor. There is a County Manager in each county responsible for the operations of the centers. 2) After the center supervisor you may contact the central office by telephone at 419-784-2150. If these communications are not helpful then you may follow the grievance procedure outlined below.

Persons having a complaint or concern regarding an area of operation of Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission — Child Development Programs are encouraged to complete a Grievance form (following this section of the handbook and available at the NOCAC Central Office, 1933 E. Second Street, Defiance, OH 43512) and mail it to the attention of the Child Development Director. The Child Development Director will coordinate the grievance procedure.

A response regarding the area of concern will be sent within 7 days to the person sending in a written complaint. This response may include an explanation of operations and/or a plan of action to correct a situation.

Following the receipt of the agency response, persons may request or provide additional information by phone or Grievance form. Persons making a grievance following the above procedure will be kept confidential if requested. Grievances may be discussed with appropriate staff as needed.




